WHAT IS ITINERARY

Itinerary is a feature on the AMO user platform that allows you to group multiple U.S. clinical experiences together. Instead of applying to multiple programs with multiple applications, using the "Add to Itinerary" feature lets you generate a schedule of multiple clinical experiences. Once your itinerary is set, you can apply, pay for, upload documents, and reserve all programs on your itinerary directly from a single dashboard.

BENEFITS OF ITINERARY

From simplifying logistics to loading documents required for each of your rotations, using the itinerary feature has many benefits.

Centralize Your Applications

Because the itinerary feature links your applications together, uploading required documents is easier than ever. Itinerary takes the repetition out of uploading documents required across multiple rotations. Now, when you upload a document to your itinerary, it is uploaded to all your applications. You will also have one centralized list of required documents, so you know exactly what you need to upload and when.
